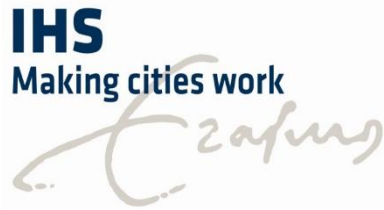


Background of HSMI:

The housing and urban infrastructure sectors are at the core of the global and local issues plaguing our cities and urbanization. The strategic intelligence required for a sustainable growth strategy includes urban innovation, inclusion, resilience, environment and resources, Infrastructure and services, social and economic equity, diplomacy and justice. There is need to build knowledge



platforms, document and share best practices and propose policy and planning measures for managing the rapid urbanization that is messy and haphazard. Cities across the globe face social, economic, political and environment changes and it is critical to educate, network and train the city practitioners and urban managers to take up the challenges such as climate change and informal growth. The need for sustainable and smart solutions for utilizing the opportunities of cities as engines of social and economic growth is not lost upon the world. HUDCO responded to the need for training the officials of its implementing and borrowing agencies such as State Housing boards, urban development authorities and local bodies to plan, formulate and implement projects and to mobilize and utilize resources economically and effectively. The Corporation under Indo-Dutch collaboration founded HSMI in 1985 with the mentorship of the Institute for Housing and Urban Development Studies (I.H.S.), Rotterdam, the Netherlands as a dedicated Training & Research Institution at the national-level, established to carry out capacity building in human settlement management, for the benefit of professionals engaged in the housing and urban development sector, international participants and HUDCO's own functionaries. It has also been setup to infuse professionalism and strengthen capacities for consultancy in project planning by providing a knowledge platform and networking forum for national and international organizations in the urban sector. While strengthening the borrowing agencies through training HSMI helps in business development for HUDCO by incubating viable projects to improve HUDCO's own lending operations directly and indirectly. Some key collaborations have laid the foundation of HSMI such as IHSP, DTUDP & MoU with IHS.

The Indian Human Settlements Programme (IHSP) was established in April 1985 through a joint collaboration between the Housing And Urban Development Corporation and the Institute For Housing And Urban Development Studies Rotterdam. The program aims at systematic development of training courses for mid career and middle management level professionals engaged in the planning, implementation and monitoring of shelter, environmental improvement and community development. The long-term objectives of the IHSP were to help HSMI to develop into a self reliant training institution capable of organising programs related to housing and urban development and to deal with the general issues of housing, environment and social development. Through this program HSMI gained a good reputation in the country as a training institute having a qualified and motivated faculty.
